## **Pastor's Ponderings**

#### What's in a Name?

Once every three years, us folks who use the Revised Common Lectionary—that's what tells us which passages of Scripture to read when—read (almost) the entire book of Philemon. And that time is once again upon us; this Sunday we will read Philemon 1-21. These are verses, not chapters. There is only one chapter in this book—a short letter written by Paul to his "brother" (in Christ) Philemon, the wealthy head of a house church. The subject of the letter is Onesimus—another "brother" (in Christ) Paul has come to know while he is imprisoned.

Who is Onesimus, exactly, and what is his relationship to Philemon? Onesimus is the "useful" one—that's what his name means. And he is useful to Philemon—or least he was. Onesimus was Philemon's slave. Paul is writing this letter to arrange for Onesimus' return to Philemon. Wait, what? The Apostle Paul is returning a runaway slave?

Unfortunately, this is how some (including pro-slavery American Christians in the 18th and 19th centuries) abused this letter. But Paul isn't sending Philemon a slave. He's sending him a brother—"no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother." (Philemon 16)

Further, playing on the name Onesimus, that is, "useful," Paul subtly jabs, "Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and me." (Philemon 11)

As your slave, he was "useless." Now, made your brother in Christ—liberated by Christ—only now is he freed to live into his name. Freed to be Paul's brother. Philemon's brother. Our brother.

Might I suggest that if we are using Scripture to keep our brothers and sisters—our siblings in Christ—"enslaved" in real or metaphorical ways, we're doing it wrong. The good news of Jesus Christ is liberating. Both for us, for all our neighbors, and all our siblings in Christ. Otherwise, how can we call it "good news?"
